Protected at Camp San Luis Obispo, Presidio of Monterey Annex and Parks Reserve Forces Training Area (California)

Habitat: Deep pools with many overhanging willows and intermixed fringe of cattails

Up to 5.1 inches in length, the largest native frog in the western United States

Young frogs have been observed to be active during the day and night, whereas adult frogs are mainly active at night

Live 8 to 10 years

Listed as threatened on May 23, 1996
